Take this Course and Perhaps your Disaster Won't be One

The Federal Emergency Management Agency began promoting nationwide use of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) concept in 1994. Since then, CERTs have been established in hundreds of communities throughout the country including the town of Atherton.

CERT training promotes a partnering effort between emergency services and the people they serve. **The goal is for emergency personnel to train Atherton residents of the neighborhoods, community organizations, or workplaces in basic response skills.** CERT members are then included as emergency response resources for their area. If a catastrophic event overwhelms or delays the community's first responders, CERT members can assist others by applying the basic response and organizational skills they learned during training. These skills can help save and sustain lives following a disaster until help arrives. CERT skills can also apply to daily emergencies.



E-Waste Recycling Event

The new California Universal Waste Law went into effect February 8, 2006, for residents and small businesses.

Households can no longer dispose of universal waste in the garbage such as batteries, electronic devices, florescent lights, and mercury thermostats. The Department of Toxic Substances Control tested various electronics and deemed them too hazardous to be thrown in the landfill because of the high concentrations of metals such as lead and copper. These banned items need to be dropped off at a household hazardous waste collection event or a recycling facility such as the Allied/BFI Recyclery.



To celebrate Earth Day, the Town of Atherton will be holding a one-day E-Waste Recycling Event. **On Saturday, April 22, from 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., residents can dispose of unwanted electronic devices.** The event will be held at the Atherton Train Station parking lot. AERC

Recycling Solutions is partnering with the Town to collect, transport, and recycle all materials collected.

The following types of electronic equipment will be accepted during the event: Computer equipment including monitors, CPU units, hard disk drives, modems, laptops and computer accessories such as keyboards, speakers, mice, etc.; Office equipment including photocopiers, fax machines, telephones, adding machines; Personal electronics including televisions, cellular phones and telephones, stereos, radios, CD players, DVD players, VCR/VHS players, electronic toys and cameras.

Take advantage of this opportunity to unload those electronic dinosaurs such as eight tracks and stereos.



Prepare Your Garden for Spring with Free Compost

It's springtime and that means gardening. Back by popular demand, Rethink Waste, Allied Waste, and the Town of Atherton have teamed up to give away compost on Saturday, May 6, 2006. The compost is made from yard trimmings, which make up more than half of California's municipal waste, collected at the curb, and composted at a local composting facility. Residents may bag the compost at no charge from Holbrook-Palmer Park, 150 Watkins Avenue, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., as long as the supply lasts. Residents must bring their own containers and shovels. The compost may be used as an amendment to enrich the soil for lawns, gardens, ornamental plants, trees and potted plants. Applying nutrient rich organic compost to your yard is a non-chemical alternative to fertilizers. Anyone interested in making their own compost should contact www.recycleworks.org for more information on composting workshops, worm composting and reduced-priced bins.



CERT graduate Lisa Tonelli's motivation to take the six-night class was watching what she called "The Katrina Debacle" in which needy people weren't able to get help for weeks.

"I signed up for CERT because I'd rather be in a position to help others than to be waiting for someone to come and help me," she said. "The CERT training was really interesting and a lot of fun. The people at the Menlo Park Fire Protection District do a great job of instructing by keeping the meeting moving in spite of the size of our 50-member class."

Another Atherton CERT graduate is Elizabeth Ouren. She said that what she found really valuable was the combination of classroom training and role playing.

"The classroom training taught us what are the most important things to expect in a disaster," she said. "I think this experience will help keep us from going into shock because we now know how to actually deal with a disaster's realities. It's far more valuable than just reading a book."


Ouren added that it would be rewarding to work with other people during a disaster who have completed the CERT training. "It makes it easier for everyone if lots of people really know how to help others during an emergency," she added.

Ginger Levick said her neighborhood in the Walsh Road area will soon have a meeting to list everyone's personal skills that could be valuable during an emergency. She intends to urge every attendee to take the CERT course "because it's very important that we know how to do this for ourselves, and for others. It's an obligation, particularly in a time of crisis."

Atherton Police Department Resident Information

It's that time of the year before school gets out and vacations occur, the perfect time to get your information updated in the police department data base. The sheet that we call our "Blue Form" will enable us to have all the necessary emergency information you chose to provide us. Along with resident information, you can give us the information of someone who can be contacted when you are not at home. Alarm information, reset codes, gate codes, and the location of your alarm panel are the types of information we need. Remember, if you provide us a key to your home, we can easily get inside during an emergency; and if you get locked out, we always have a key! As many of you already know, the police department has its own alarm monitoring service. You can connect to us exclusively or have a commercial account along with our free service, if you choose.

Come to the police department to pick up your form, or you can call 650-688-6500 and we can either mail it or fax it to a location of your choosing.



VOTER EDUCATION MONTH

The Secretary of State's Office, in conjunction with the City Clerks Association of California and the California Association of Clerks and Election Officials, is sponsoring April as "Voter Education Month" to let every citizen know how simple, convenient, and important it is to register and vote. There are a few things every voter should know about the statewide primary election coming up on **June 6, 2006**.

LAST DAY TO REGISTER TO VOTE – May 22

In order to vote you must be registered. If you are not already registered at your current address, it is very easy to do so. You can obtain a form to register to vote on-line from the Secretary of State's web site www.ss.ca.gov. Register early to make sure you receive all the informational materials.

LAST DAY TO APPLY FOR AN ABSENTEE BALLOT – May 30

If you wish to vote by mail, you can apply for an absentee ballot by using the form on the back of your "sample ballot." This will be mailed to you 3 or 4 weeks before the election. Make sure that it is received by the elections office not later than May 30th.

LEARNING ABOUT CANDIDATES AND ISSUES

You will receive an official voter information guide from the Secretary of State with nonpartisan information about each state proposition. A shorter "Easy Voter Guide" is available at www.easyvoter.org. You can find information about candidates from www.smartvoter.org or from the various candidates and their campaigns.

FINDING YOUR POLLING PLACE

Look on the back of your sample ballot for the address where you vote. Or, you can go to www.smartvoter.org or www.ss.ca.gov on Election Day (or the day before) to find your polling place. Polls are open from 7am until 8pm.

Menlo Park Atherton Education Foundation Endowment Fund is Nearing its Goal

Founded in 1982, the Menlo Park Atherton Education Foundation (MPAEF) is an award-winning, non-profit organization, with an all-volunteer board dedicated to raising funds for the four public schools of the Menlo Park City School District. Those schools include Laurel, Encinal, Oak Knoll, and Hillview elementary and middle schools. The foundation contributed over \$1.5M last year alone, and its contribution represents 6.5% of the total school district budget. Most of the donations come directly from parents and other community members through an annual campaign and a district-wide dinner auction event held each spring.

Additionally, the MPAEF has created an Endowment Fund (with a \$2,000,000 target). The Endowment Fund was created to set aside a pool of money that will generate enough annual investment income to guarantee a steady flow of funding for one particular objective: Excellence in Teaching. Unlike most funds donated through the MPAEF which are directed to the areas of greatest need on a year-by-year basis, the Endowment represents the foundation's commitment to consistently fund this one specific area over the long term.

"Excellence in Teaching" was selected as the focus for the endowment because research has shown that it is the #1 factor that schools can address to improve the overall educational results for their students. This category includes a broad range of investments ranging from offering professional development and training to supplying tools and resources that our teachers need. By setting up this standalone endowment, the foundation can ensure that the school district will always keep "Excellence in Teaching" as a clear priority.

Thanks to the generosity of charter members and other donors, the Endowment Fund reached the half-way mark of \$1,000,000 in June 2005. Furthermore, another \$250,000 has been pledged as a matching fund to help raise the next \$250,000. Many gifts have come from parents in the district, but a significant portion of the funding has come from "alumni" families of the district, grandparents, businesses, and other community leaders who believe in public education and have chosen to support this very important cause.

"We're truly fortunate to have so many generous residents in our community who believe so strongly in education. In fact, many of our largest donors have been school neighbors who don't even currently have children in our school system. They share a common belief in the value of public education and want to see the continuation of the historic tradition of outstanding schools in Menlo Park and Atherton," added Charlot Singleton, Atherton resident and long time MPAEF supporter, former board president and recent winner of Gentry magazine's prestigious Star Award for community service.

Historical Artifacts Survey

The survey of Atherton's historical artifacts is nearly complete. The survey team documented more than 40 artifacts throughout the Town, with a special emphasis on a concentration of artifacts associated with the Flood family estate in Lindenwood. The results of the survey will be presented to the Town Council as the Draft Inventory of Historical Artifacts for review and public comment at an upcoming Council meeting. Town Planner Lisa Costa-Sanders and Historical Consultant Laura Jones met with a group of citizen volunteers to outline a proposal to promote the preservation of the historical artifacts through adoption of an ordinance. The draft ordinance was discussed by the General Plan Committee on April 5th and will be presented to the Town Council at a future council meeting.


