REACH CODE UPDATE

WHAT IS THE ELECTRIC READINESS REACH CODE?

The Electric Readiness Reach Code establishes updated building standards for new construction and major home renovations. Its purpose is to ensure homes are equipped to accommodate future electric systems, such as electric water heaters, heat pumps and electric cooking appliances. By requiring these preparations, the Code supports the community’s transition away from gas-powered systems and advances local goals for sustainability and energy efficiency.

WHY IS THIS IMPORTANT?

1. **Advancing State and Regional Climate Goals:** This ordinance aligns with California’s broader efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and transition toward a cleaner, more sustainable energy future.
2. **Enhancing Energy Efficiency:** Proactively preparing homes for electric systems promotes lower energy consumption, improved indoor air quality and greater energy efficiency across Atherton’s housing stock.
3. **Reducing Long-Term Costs:** Incorporating electric-ready infrastructure during construction or renovation is far more cost-effective than future retrofits, easing the eventual transition for homeowners and avoiding unnecessary expenses.

KEY FEATURES OF THE ELECTRIC READINESS REACH CODE

1. **Electric-Ready Infrastructure:** New construction and major renovations must include the necessary electrical infrastructure to support future electric appliances. This includes dedicated panels, conduits and space for systems such as heat pumps, electric cooking equipment and water heaters.
2. **Comprehensive Applicability:** Requirements extend beyond the primary residence to include kitchens, laundry rooms, pool and spa equipment, outdoor cooking areas and fireplaces — ensuring these spaces are prepared for future electrification without the need for costly upgrades.
3. **Practical and Cost-Efficient Implementation:** The Code does not mandate immediate replacement of gas appliances. Instead, it ensures homes are equipped with electric-ready infrastructure during initial construction or renovation, minimizing future retrofit expenses and disruptions.
4. **Targeted Renovation Requirements:** For major renovations affecting kitchens, laundry rooms or utility spaces, upgrades to the electrical panel will be required to guarantee adequate capacity for future electric appliances.

HOW WILL THIS AFFECT HOMEOWNERS?

New Construction: All newly built homes must comply with the electric readiness standards, ensuring they are equipped to accommodate future electric systems.

Major Renovations: Homeowners undertaking substantial renovations — such as kitchen remodels, or adding features like a pool or spa — will be required to incorporate electric readiness infrastructure as part of their project.

WHAT IS NEXT?

Implementation: The updated Electric Readiness Reach Code will take effect with the submission of building permit applications. Homeowners and contractors should review the new requirements in advance to ensure timely and efficient compliance.

Congratulations to this year’s winners, and thank you to all who nominated trees to celebrate the natural heritage of Atherton.

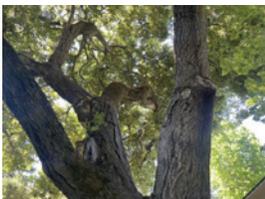

ATHERTON'S ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PLAN UNDERWAY

This spring, Atherton's Public Works Department began work on an Active Transportation Plan in partnership with Alta Planning + Design. The Active Transportation Plan is an update to the 2014 Town of Atherton Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan. It is designed to:

- Provide a comprehensive plan for bicycle and pedestrian improvements throughout the Town
- Improve bicycle and pedestrian safety
- Provide connectivity with adjacent communities
- Become more strategic and successful in competing for bicycle/pedestrian grant funding
- Identify barriers and solutions for residents to safely access bicycle and pedestrian destinations within the Town of Atherton and other regional destinations

At the Town's 2025 Earth Day Festival, planners met with the Atherton community to introduce the Active Transportation Plan and receive initial feedback from community members about:

- How and where they get around
- Where they wish to go in and around Atherton
- What barriers prevent them from walking or biking as much as they might like

This event was followed by an online survey and web map for community members to fill out. By the time the survey closed in June, planners received hundreds of comments from dozens of community members.

Over the summer, the project team will review these comments and technical analyses to provide a series of recommendations that support overarching transportation goals. These recommendations will be discussed at public meetings, including the Transportation, Bicycle and Pedestrian Safety Committee, as well as in other venues and through online engagement. Potential recommendations for street improvements to support pedestrian and bicycle safety will also be shared in the fall.

After this upcoming engagement is complete, the project team will finalize the recommendations as part of the Active Transportation Plan's final report, to be prepared for potential adoption by the City Council in 2026.

BICYCLE AND PEDESTRIAN SAFETY IS EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY

PROMOTING SAFETY ON OUR ROADS: A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

As we continue to promote a safer, more walkable and bikeable community, the Atherton Police Department reminds all residents that roadway safety is a shared responsibility. Whether you're driving, biking or walking, each of us plays a critical role in preventing collisions and protecting lives.

DRIVERS:

- Slow down and stay alert — especially in residential neighborhoods, school zones and at crosswalks.
- Avoid distractions. Put the phone down — calls and texts can wait.
- Yield to pedestrians and bicyclists when turning or approaching intersections.
- Allow at least 3 feet of space when passing cyclists.

BICYCLISTS:

- Be seen — wear bright clothing and use lights and reflectors day and night.
- Ride in the same direction as traffic and obey all traffic signs and signals.
- Always wear a helmet.
- Use proper hand signals and stay predictable in your movements.

PEDESTRIANS:

- Be seen — wear visible clothing and stay alert.
- Walk on the left side of the road, facing oncoming traffic.
- Make eye contact with drivers before crossing. Cross at marked crosswalks or intersections whenever possible.
- Avoid using phones or wearing headphones while walking near traffic.

Let's work together to keep Atherton safe for everyone. One moment of awareness can prevent a lifetime of regret.

LIVING WITH COYOTES IN ATHERTON

Coyotes are a regular part of the natural environment in San Mateo County and are occasionally seen within the Town of Atherton. It's important to maintain safe practices that respect their presence as these highly adaptable animals travel through residential neighborhoods, open spaces and creek corridors.

SEASONAL ACTIVITY

Coyotes are more frequently seen during the spring and summer months, particularly from March through August, which marks their denning and pup-rearing season. During this period, coyotes may be more active in daylight hours while foraging and protecting their young. Increased sightings are normal and not necessarily a cause for concern.

PUBLIC SAFETY AND PREVENTION TIPS

To minimize the potential for human-wildlife conflict and to help safeguard pets and property, the Town encourages residents to observe the following guidelines:

- **Do not feed wildlife.** Feeding coyotes, whether directly or indirectly through unsecured garbage, pet food, compost or fallen fruit is strongly discouraged and contributes to habituation.
- **Secure attractants.** Keep trash in wildlife-resistant containers and remove backyard food sources such as bird seed and outdoor pet food.
- **Supervise pets.** Coyotes may display aggressive behavior, especially toward personal pets, which they instinctively view as prey. Residents are strongly advised to keep cats indoors and walk small dogs on leashes, keeping them close. Do not leave pets unattended outdoors, especially at dawn or dusk.
- **Discourage interaction.** If a coyote approaches, make yourself appear large, shout, clap or use a noise-making device to encourage it to leave. This technique, known as "hazing," helps maintain a healthy boundary between people and wildlife.
- **Be alert.** When walking or recreating near open spaces, remain aware of your surroundings and keep pets close at hand.

RESPONSE AND CONTACTS

Coyotes are an established part of California's natural landscape. With proper precautions and informed awareness, residents can safely coexist with these animals. The Town of Atherton remains committed to promoting public safety and responsible wildlife stewardship.

While the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) is the lead agency responsible for wildlife management statewide, the Peninsula Humane Society (PHS) provides animal control services to Atherton and will respond only in cases involving coyotes posing an imminent threat to people. Please note that trapping and relocating wildlife is prohibited by law.

HOW HIP HOUSING'S ADU MATCH PROGRAM HELPS ATHERTON RESIDENTS



After her mother passed away and their longtime renter moved out, Cathy—who grew up in Atherton but now lives across the Bay—still wanted “someone on the property” to look in on her 89-year-old father, Hal. But managing listings, screenings and showings from afar was more than she had bandwidth for.

When a flyer from HIP Housing arrived, she set it aside — until months later, when she realized the nonprofit could handle “all the background checks, employment history, the matching — everything I couldn’t do.”

WHAT IS HIP HOUSING'S ADU MATCH PROGRAM?

HIP Housing facilitates connection between Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) Home Providers and Home Seekers. HIP Housing can conduct interviews virtually, in office or at a home visit. HIP Housing can assist with client applications, conduct background searches, help determine rent ranges and provide resource packets for new Providers.

HIP Housing introduced two potential prospects. The second, Edith, immediately clicked. “[HIP Housing] held my hand through the whole process,” Cathy said, “from the living-together agreement, lease details, even setting the rent.” The match has been “a huge blessing.”

Their ADU tenant, Edith, chats with her dad, sweeps the walkways and picks up small tasks as therapeutic activity. She recently joined the family in a special moment to celebrate Hal’s 89th birthday! With enthusiasm and gratitude, Cathy shared that “she’s honestly become kind of an honorary family member to us too.”

WHY SHOULD OTHER ATHERTON HOMEOWNERS TAKE A LOOK?

Cathy says she’d recommend the program “100% — actually 200% if I could!” due to their professionalism and care, especially to owners wary of advertising an empty unit or inviting strangers onto their property. “I appreciated the third party taking on such a huge task I couldn’t do,” she explained. “And to me, using HIP felt safer than posting online.”

HIP Housing’s support doesn’t end with placement. The month-to-month agreement gives both parties flexibility, and the Home Sharing Coordinator remains available to mediate if issues arise. While HIP Housing does not provide tax assistance, homeowners may be eligible for certain tax benefits or deductions when renting out an ADU. But beyond logistics and incentives, Cathy sees deeper value in the program. The connections that the program facilitates “introduce new perspectives and benefits everyone.”

For Cathy and her family, the ADU Match program delivered peace of mind, trusted companionship for her father and a meaningful way to contribute to Atherton’s housing solutions — proof that an underused ADU can become a win-win for both homeowner and community.

FISCAL YEAR 25-26 TOWN BUDGET

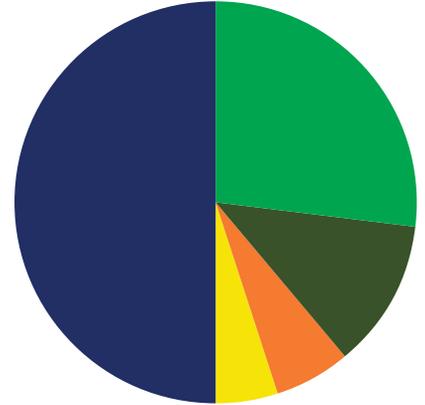
The Town of Atherton adopted its FY 2025/26 Budget on June 18, following four public meetings and community feedback gathered from the 2025 survey. This year's budget reflects a continued focus on fiscal responsibility, public safety, infrastructure and quality of life.

BUDGET SUMMARY

- Revenues: \$24.7 million
- Expenses: \$22.1 million
- Surplus before other financing sources and uses: \$2.5 million

WHERE THE MONEY GOES (OPERATING BUDGET: \$22.1M)

- 50% – Public Safety
- 27% – General Government
- 12% – Public Works
- 6% – Parks & Community Services
- 5% – Reserves & Other



While core services remain fully funded, over \$5 million is being invested in capital projects to support long-term infrastructure, traffic safety and park improvements.

CAPITAL PRIORITIES

Drainage improvements:

- Atherton Channel upgrades
- Stormwater system planning
- New culverts and detention design

Transportation projects:

- Alameda de las Pulgas Traffic & Safety (design phase)
- El Camino Real Complete Streets Gap Closure (planning wraps this year)
- Bicycle & Pedestrian Master Plan update

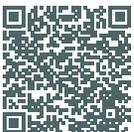
Community enhancements:

- New playground and restrooms at Holbrook-Palmer Park
- Early planning for circulation/access at Town Center and Library campus

TOWN OF ATHERTON 2025 COMMUNITY SURVEY RESULTS

The Town of Atherton is pleased to share the results of its 2025 Community Survey. The survey reveals that an overwhelming majority of residents are highly satisfied with Atherton's quality of life and municipal services.

Atherton City Council and staff will utilize these insights to inform policy decisions, prioritize projects and allocate resources effectively. The Town hopes to use the survey as a starting point for a regular check in with the community every few years. Ongoing community engagement will remain a cornerstone of Atherton's approach to governance.

ATHERTON'S HOUSING ELEMENT CERTIFIED BY THE STATE

Atherton has reached a major milestone in its long-range planning efforts: the Town's 2023–2031 Housing Element was officially certified by the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) on May 5, 2025. This certification confirms that Atherton's adopted Housing Element meets state statutory requirements, including the successful completion of Program 3.11(C), which supports new multi-family housing development.

The Town previously submitted a revised Housing Element in March 2025 following feedback from HCD. These updates aimed to strengthen the Town's plan for accommodating a variety of housing types while remaining consistent with Atherton's unique character and development standards.

To support implementation of the Housing Element, the City Council adopted updates to the Atherton Municipal Code earlier this year. These zoning amendments ensure local regulations align with state housing goals and the policies in the Town's adopted plan.

In parallel, the Town continues to work on updates to the Safety Element of its General Plan. This section addresses how Atherton plans for and mitigates environmental hazards such as wildfires, flooding and extreme heat. A state-required Vulnerability Assessment is currently under review by staff and the Fire Marshal, and a public review process will follow.

Atherton remains committed to thoughtful, balanced planning that meets state mandates, protects public safety and reflects the community's values.
